Thanksgiving

Practical Survey of Actions

"The Third Point is to ask an account of my soul....as to thoughts, words, and then deeds."

Lord, help me to recognize your call in the intimate core of my being (moods, feelings, desires, thoughts).

- * During the past few hours how has our Lord been prodding me? What has God been asking of me?
- * What are the subtle, intimate, affective ways in which the Lord has been dealing with me during these hours?
- * Have I been responding to God's call to me?
- * Am I living as a son/daughter of the Father?
- * Am I moved and motivated by the Spirit or am I self-moved and self-motivated?

Lord, unveil that area of my heart where you are especially calling for conversion, the place where you are nudging me to turn to or from. Am I forgetting some area on purpose, afraid of your judgment or the difficulty required in

changing certain ways and patterns?

Make me honest and open, Lord, that I may experience you in the burning fire of Your Word. Help me recognize my faults and correct what you want me to correct.
